

DRINKING WATER NOTICE

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

The City of Superior is required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water meets health standards.

What Does This Mean?

During the monitoring period of **January 2026**, we did not monitor or test for total coliform bacteria and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water at this time. Although this situation does not create a risk to public health, as our customers you have a right to know what happened and what we did to correct the situation.

What Should I Do?

This is not an emergency. There is nothing you need to do at this time. Alternate water, such as bottled water, is not required and you do not need to boil your water or take other actions. However, if you have specific health concerns, you may want to consult a physician.

What Happened? What Is Being Done?

Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, waterborne pathogens may be present or that a potential pathway exists through which contamination may enter the drinking water distribution system. The system regrets its failure to collect routine total coliform samples and will work to ensure that the testing is observed in the future.

Corrective Action: Samples were taken and rejected by the state lab due to the post office not delivering them on time - We now hand deliver samples to the state

Expected Resolution Date

The system is scheduled to sample for total coliform bacteria again in **February 2026**.
